CHAIR'S ANNUAL REPORT 2006

I am pleased to report the following highlights for 2006:

- Her Excellency Michaëlle Jean, the Governor General of Canada, confirmed the continued patronage of the Canadian Pony Club by her office.
- A very productive Discipline's conference was held in Winnipeg in January resulting in many recommendations for updates to rules and improvements to competitions. CPC rules and proficiency levels continue to be evaluated.
- In February 2006, the CPC Executive delivered important information in four key areas of our Governance: Membership, Finance, Risk Management & Insurance and Testing & Education, at a National Chair's Conference in Toronto to over 70 of our key volunteers. Due to its overwhelming success, CPC will deliver to the zones starting in 2007 and a number of regions planned to run mini versions locally.
- The CPC Strategic Plan and Sponsorship package, the "Proud to be in Pony Club" presentation and a "New Parent" DVD were developed to address the promotion of individual membership and the organization as a whole.
- The Sponsorship committee launched the first official CPC calendar (2007) as a fundraising partnership with the regions, composed of many delightful pictures of our members. The Board of Directors has determined that the profits from the calendars will be committed for the use of our members to be reserved in a Youth/Anniversary fund.
- The Board of Directors also confirmed the establishment of the National CPC Wall of Recognition with the CPC Wall of Fame to also pay tribute to our Honourary Life Members, Honourary Life Directors and Chair's Award winners along with our esteemed alumni, to be a "virtual" wall that everyone can access on the national website. Watch for the official launch.
- The 75th Anniversary Committee continues to work on a number of other exciting projects to celebrate the CPC Diamond Jubilee in 2009 with plans for local, regional and national events.
- Volunteer pins for 5 & 10 years of service were developed for regional use.
- Associate and Affiliate membership categories were revised and fine tuned to be more inclusive, as requested by our membership.
- As a result of a generous donation by the family, a new trophy to honour our full "A" members was established as the "Rockwell Princess Elizabeth Trophy" in memory of Adele Rockwell, who was the first member to achieve her "A" test in Canada.
- Quiz was established as an official national discipline with Carol Weiler being voted in as the first National Quiz Chair in November.

- The Board approved a new Branch Report and Charter Renewal form for use starting in 2007.

In 2006 I attended the following national events as a representative of the Board:

- International and National Tetrathlon hosted by the WOR
- National PPG "A" Championships hosted by COR and
- National Quiz hosted by Saskatchewan Region in October.

I am always so impressed by the skills, sportsmanship and camaraderie demonstrated by our members at these events. It makes me proud to be a volunteer for this organization. I would also like to recognize the continued sponsorship of Apple Saddlery as a major contributor to our regional, national and international competitions with hats, saddle pads and other championship items.

In 2006 we welcomed the following new directors: Marcia Cooper for BCIN, Billi Solverson for ABN, Nancy Hibbert for SK and Debi Roberson for COR, as well as two new youth Active Members: Isabelle Forsstrom (West) and Danielle Bechard (East).

Congratulations are extended to our new Honourary Life Members: Bob Inglis & Elizabeth Inglis of COR and Nonie Mulcaster of SK and to two new Honourary Life Directors: Margo Gaglione of ANR and Val Crowe of Manitoba. The National Chair's Award went to Del Zelmer for his many years of dedication to all the national disciplines as well as his perseverance as the organizer for IPE 2005.

As the year ended we said goodbye to Virginia Buchanan-Smith who completed her term as the Past National Chair of CPC, Julie Walker as Director for Saskatchewan, Bill Murray as Director for COR, Colleen Carroll-Nisbett as Director for New Brunswick/PEI and Del Zelmer as Director for WOR and National Chair for Disciplines. Thank you all for your dedication and contributions to our programs during your terms. You have had a major impact on the productivity and well being of this great organization.

As I end my two terms as your National Chair, I look fondly back at the challenges and opportunities that we have faced head on during this four year period. It was only through the goodwill and commitment of the entire Board of Directors, our Chairs and our Administrative support, working as one, that we were able to accomplish so much. Thank you to everyone who made this journey a joy.

REPORT OF NATIONAL CHAIR FOR DISCIPLINES 2006 Submitted by Del Zelmer

The year began with Disciplines Conference held in Winnipeg , January 27-29. Sixty-eight Delegates from all the Disciplines and from all Regions attended. A rotation schedule for all Zone, National & International events was established through 2008. Disciplines reviewed and updated their Rule Books. Dressage established a model for a new National Dressage Championship in Starter, PT & T levels and Show Jumping established a new National Medal Competition starting in 2007. A full report on the Conference can be found in the proceedings of the April, 2006 AGM.

Although the new National Dressage Championships were planned for 2006, they did not get implemented and are scheduled to begin in 2007. National Championships were held in both PPG and Tetrathlon. National "A" PPG Championships were hosted by COR. The "A" Championships were won by the "Hoof-Hearted" team from COR comprised of Sean Cruickshanks, Luke Durward, Kaylin Nauta, Madison Reeves and James Cruickshanks. The National Masters PPG Championships were hosted by BC Lower Mainland. The Masters Championships were won by the COR "Cowboys" team of Jesse Durward, Mike Durward, Samantha MacDonald, Laura Parliament and Mori Cruickshanks. National Tetrathlon was hosted by WOR at Seneca College in King City. The Championships were won by the Western Ontario team of Alix Findlay, Naomi Krucker, Nakita Krucker and Danielle Kelton. Mathea Stevens from SLOV was the overall Senior Woman Champion. Alix Findlay from WOR was the overall Junior Woman Champion and Luke Durward from COR was the overall Junior Man Champion.

Three International Competitions took place in 2006. The International Mounted Games Exchange was hosted by U.K. from August 9 – 24. The Canadian entry was comprised of Shauna Chester from COR, Erin Hendrikson from WOR, Heather McKenzie from ANR, Jessica McVittie from COR, and Colby Stafford from BCLM. Although the team had a disappointing last place finish, great times were had with many new friendships made. International Tetrathlon was hosted by Canada in conjunction with the National Championships. Canada did not field a men's team. The Canadian Women's team was comprised of Jean Eagleson from WOR along with Kirsty Edwards, Thalia Edwards, and Lindsay Willis all from ABS. The ladies placed third, ahead of the USA but behind the winning team from UK and second place Ireland. The top Canadian woman was Jean Eagleson with a 6th place finish overall.

An International Fox Hunting Exchange was hosted by USPC in Virginia from November 28 – December 8, 2006. There were teams from Canada, U.S., Ireland and the U.K. Representing Canada was Jessica McGuire from WOR, D'Arcy Hutcheson from COR, Jamie Stephenson from ABS and Katie Monaghan from ABS. A report by Tina Walker-Coach is provided.

This will be my last report as Disciplines Chair. It has been a rewarding four years for me and I have enjoyed working with the various Discipline Chairs over that time. Cheryl Leask from ABS is the new Chair. Cheryl has a wealth of experience across all disciplines and will be an asset to Pony Club in this role.

Show Jumping Report **2006**

The year began with the disciplines conference in Winnipeg. The agenda was very full, and took the entire weekend, with a late session on the Saturday night, to complete.

The biggest item on the agenda was the adoption of the new Show Jumping Rules. The rules were rewritten to eliminate the need to use the EC rule book. All the rules needed to run a Pony Club competition are now in our own rule document. Additional rules for running Hunter classes were included in the new document, as well as section on running a 4 phase Medal Final. New forms were also included in the appendices, which will assist in ensuring that all Pony Club Show Jumping activities are properly sanctioned. In addition, these forms, once filled in and submitted to the National Show Jumping chair, will assist in monitoring the program nation wide.

One of the items on the agenda was Schooling Shows. Regions are encouraged to offer competitive schooling opportunities, either in the form of a schooling show with schooling rounds, where members can receive instruction on course, prior to the actual competition, or as clinics based on a show round format, with instruction given in how to correctly walk and ride a course, including speed rounds and jump off's. The purpose is to ensure that the program is focusing on the actual sport of Show Jumping, with all its requirements including the speed element, and not simply teaching members to jump over obstacles.

It was decided at the conference to hold a National Medal competition, which will be hosted alternately in the East and West. One member per region will qualify at the Regional finals, or at a specific medal qualifier held by the region, to participate in the National Medal Finals the following year. The 2007 finals will be hosted by Alberta North Region and held at Amberlea Meadows Stables on June 29th –July 2nd..

Discipline Proficiency Standard was discussed, with a mixed reaction from the committee. The main bone of contention was at what point to allow members to specialize. It was decided that the program should be perused, starting after members have passed the C2. To date we are no closer to implementing DPS. I submitted a detailed outline of the first 2 levels of the proposed program, to be presented at the Examiners Conference, which also included an opportunity to begin training our own CPC officials, yet another item of discussion from the conference. However, I have had no official response to the proposal so I am unable to give any indication as to the status of DPS at this point in time.

The Strategic plan, currently being developed for Pony Club, suggests that one goal should be to have Pony Club members competing at the Pan Am Games, World Equestrian Games and the Olympic Games in all the disciplines. If we are to meet these goals we must recognize the need to allow our members to specialize in specific disciplines, and develop a program to both help and encourage them.

CANADIAN PONY CLUB NATIONAL TETRATHLON REPORT 2006

Ten Canadian Pony Club regions had active Tetrathlon programs in 2006. Two more regions, BCIN and Manitoba are in the early stages of developing Tetrathlon programs. As in past years, Tetrathlon activity in some regions is increasing while it drops off in other regions. Across the country, program development and member participation seems to be directly proportional to the enthusiasm and dedication of the various Regional Tetrathlon Chairs.

Close proximity to active Modern Pentathlon programs can benefit regional Tetrathlon programs at the development level but unfortunately, we also lose many of our older and most skilled Tetrathletes to Modern Pentathlon, just when they are reaching their peak. Many of our senior members will continue to compete in both disciplines but when conflict of dates arises, they will invariably choose CAMPA over CPC. The Canadian Pony Club and Canadian Modern Pentathlon Association need to recognize that each group can benefit the other and find ways to increase this mutual support.

Last year nine regions applied for National Tetrathlon Program Grants. Grants of \$100.00 each were awarded to Nova Scotia, St Lawrence Ottawa Valley, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta South, Alberta Central, Alberta North, B.C. Lower Mainland and B.C. Interior. These grants support education and development of Tetrathlon at the regional level. Additional grants of \$75 were given to Manitoba, Saskatchewan, B.C. Lower Mainland and B.C. Interior to help these regions develop new Tetrathlon programs.

I am pleased to say that all Canadian Pony Club regions had members who were active in Tetrathlon in 2006. (Manitoba and B.C. Interior have initiated an active education program and clinics for Tetrathlon but no competitions were held in 2006). These data are summarized in the table below. The overall numbers of Pony Club members in each region who participated in Tetrathlon clinics, training sessions, camps, mini meets, badge workshops and demonstrations are found in column 2. The numbers of participants at Regional and National Tetrathlon Championships are presented in columns 3 and 4.

The overall numbers of CPC members participating in Tetrathlon activities at the national, regional and branch level has declined from the previous year. Some regions have not reported their numbers of active tetrathletes, so the numbers may be higher than the figures presented above. Tetrathlon activity in WOR and COR seems to be in decline. As in recent years, we are suffering a steady loss of our male tetrathletes. Of 34 Canadian Tetrathletes at the CPC National Tetrathlon Championship in August, only 3 were boys. Some good news is that Alberta South has recently had a large group of novice and junior boys attending their clinics.

We were very fortunate to have the International Tetrathlon Exchange take place at the same time as our National Championship. Teams of 4 men and 4 women from England, Ireland and USA and 4 Canadian women (plus coaches and chaperones) made the 2006 competition a particularly enjoyable and memorable one for all involved. Canada had a complete women's team but unfortunately, no men's team. The competition was keen and everyone seemed to enjoy themselves. Thanks to the Western Ontario Region, Del Zelmer and many volunteers for making the National and International Championship a success. We received many compliments on how well our competition ran, and the quality of the accommodation, food and all competition venues, especially from our International guests.

We are looking forward to the next CPC Tetrathlon Championship to be held in Red Deer Alberta, August 6 to 10, 2007.

I would like to thank the Canadian Pony Club for their generous financial support of Tetrathlon and also our dedicated Regional Tetrathlon Chairs and volunteers who contribute so much to the sport.

Annual Dressage Report 2006

This year began with the disciplines conference in Winnipeg in February, where the National Dressage Committee completely revamped the competition structure of dressage within the Canadian Pony Club. The committee members went home having done a SWOT analysis of dressage and come to the conclusion that CPC has a great deal to offer. . A schedule of National Dressage Championship competitions was presented for 2006 and 2007.

The rulebook was rewritten to reflect these changes and presented to the board at the AGM in April. The board accepted the recommendations of the dressage committee, but asked that the rulebook be further revised to remove all references to Equine Canada. The final product was to be a stand alone document that would fulfil the requirements of competitors and organizers.

In June I realized that I had to resign from my position as National Dressage Chair due to stress as a result of a violent death in my immediate family. I was unable to fulfill the request of the committee to redraft the rulebook and realized that I was not making enough of an effort to communicate with the committee and national board.

In November at the SAM an new national dressage chair was presented and chosen. I was by then able to continue in my revisions and had a first draft available in January for comments.

The Organizing Committee met at the Toronto Montessori School in August, 2005 to view the venues where the various phases of the event could be held. The site was ideal. It provided excellent accommodation and food that we were already familiar with from our Inter-Pacific experience. Additionally, the site had facilities where all phases of Tetrathlon with the exception of Riding could be held.

The International portion of the tour had to be coordinated with the USPC who were hosting the first portion of the tour. Canada was scheduled to receive the International teams in Niagara Falls on August 5. The Organizing Committee was putting the final touches on the event when word was received on July 17 that the facilities located at Toronto Montessori School would not be available due to a pending sale that failed to get bank financing. This created a situation where 70 competitors were arriving in a little over 2 weeks with nowhere to hold the event.

A search began immediately for alternate facilities. At this point most facilities were in the full swing of their summer programs and were already booked. No one could offer the comprehensive package that we had at the Toronto Montessori facilities. Approximately a week later on July 25, the facilities at Seneca College – King Campus were booked. Seneca College offered modern residences with considerable flexibility in meal planning to meet the early morning starts and late dinner hours of the Tetrathlon schedule. The gymnasium on campus provided a great area to set up a 17 station shooting range. “Shooting” with all its connotations was a somewhat scary topic for the Facility Manager. Eventually, it was necessary to educate and lobby the Dean to get approval to set up the range on campus. Seneca College did not have a swimming pool on campus, so the search was still on for a venue to hold the swimming phase. Most pools were fully booked with their summer programs. On July 31, the pool at St. Andrew’s College was finally secured for a late afternoon swim. The time of day was not optimum and an extra charge for bussing was required, but finally we had all of our venues secure. Increased costs for food, accommodation and bussing were associated with the last minute venue change and resulted in a \$2200 cost overrun.

With this unexpected venue switch, two weeks of planning time were also lost. Final preparations and fine tuning were now compressed into one week versus three. Riding and running courses had to be set and flagged, the souvenir program had to be changed and printed, the registration data had to be processed, rooms assigned, shooting relays set, running and swimming heats set, riding order of go determined, borrowed mounts confirmed, stabling needs determined, transportation confirmed, and volunteers for the competitive phases and food preparation finalized. The Organizing Committee rose to the challenge and by registration day on August 5, all pieces of the program were firmly in

place. I would like to recognize the dedication and commitment that these members of the Organizing Committee made. Thank you to the following members of the Organizing Committee – Tom & Lani Harris, Linda Agnew, Warren Townsend, Jen Zelmer, Lana McGrotty, Denise Trigatti, Ellen Olechowski, Sue Eagleson, and Anne Peace.

August 5 was changeover day to receive our International visitors from the USPC. The tour left the Washington area at 6:00 AM and headed for Niagara Falls by bus. After a long bus ride, the group encountered long lineups at the border and a delay in processing the Canadian contingent. The transfer was finally made on the American side of the Rainbow Bridge at 6:00 PM. We had hoped to provide our guests with an afternoon of activities and sightseeing in Niagara Falls which now was no longer possible. The group was getting weary from a long day of travel and hadn't eaten since a late brunch. They elected to only visit the Falls for an hour to snap some photos and look through some souvenir shops. By 8:30 PM, we were only a short distance outside of Niagara Falls where we stopped to feed everyone. Back on the bus, most dozed off for the two hour drive to King City. We arrived at the King Campus of Seneca College just before midnight. Everyone was very happy to slip into a comfortable bed.

We allowed everyone to sleep in and get a late start the next day, which was much appreciated. In the afternoon we ran the shooting relays for the International competitors and registered the National competitors as they arrived. Monday was reserved for the shooting relays of the National Competitors and horse matching and orientation for everyone. The next two days were largely devoted to the riding phase which was held at Cedar Peaks Farm in Cookstown. After the running competition Thursday morning, the group spent the day at Canada's Wonderland. Upon their return, everyone dressed up for the Awards banquet and dressed down for the dance which was still going strong when the music stopped at 2:30 AM. Everyone departed to their home destinations the next day with many new friendships made.

First place honors were reserved for the Women's team from U.K. and the Men's team from Ireland. Canada did not field a Men's team. The Women's team from Canada took third place. National honors went to the Western Ontario team of Alix Findlay, Naomi Krucker, Nakita Krucker and Danielle Kelton.

The 2006 CPC National championships were hosted by the Western Ontario Region from August 6 to August 11 in conjunction with the International Tetrathlon exchange.

Sunday morning started off with the id tables and then off to Wanuskewin Heritage Park Authority where we had a lunch, tour, dancing, and an afternoon of outdoor games and fun, followed by a stop at a tack store. Sunday evening concluded with the banquet, awards, and just for fun a calf roping opportunity for entertainment.

The U.S. Pony Club hosted the 2006 International Foxhunting Exchange in Virginia in November. There were teams of four from the U.K. Eire, Canada and the U.S. and it was, without doubt, a wonderful opportunity for the teams to mix and meet in a non-competitive environment.

Team members were split up and billeted with host families around the countryside, giving them a chance to really get to know the other teams and 'hang out'. Each day team members would be taken to different hunts and loaned horses by hunt members. The countryside was beautiful and varied, from the plains around Middleburg, out to the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Nine hunts invited the pony clubbers to hunt with them and the members were divided up each day to hunt at different hunts. The horses were excellent and the pony clubbers were invited to hunt up at the front where they could see the hounds working a scent and some even went with the whips and assisted the huntsman with his hounds, which gave them a great opportunity to see how the different huntsmen hunted their hounds. When the hounds picked up a scent there was some great galloping and jumping as all the fields were interconnected with panels or stone walls. Hunting usually lasted about three hours and was followed by some welcome tailgate 'breakfast'. The teams were also introduced to 'beagling' and 'bassetting' on foot, which has the advantage of being really close to hounds while they are enthusiastically working.

When we were not hunting we had lots of things to do and see. The National Sporting Library in Middleburg is unique in as much as it houses very many rare books and is devoted to Hunting, Shooting and Fishing. Just about anything you want to know about Field Sports you will find there. They also had an exhibition of some fifty Stubbs, Herring and Munning paintings.

One day was devoted to visiting Washington and as well as 'doing' the Natural History Museum, the National Gallery to see the mobiles and the National Air & Space Museum, they also were able to ice skate outside in the park in warm weather! Another afternoon we were invited to visit Kinross Farm, which is an amazing steeplechase facility with a one-mile, all weather track with many varied solid jumps. The indoor arena had electric doors, very fancy, and a really excellent state-of-the-art flooring that required no harrowing. We were introduced to the horses which, incidentally, also go out hunting on a regular basis as they understand that the hunt field is an excellent training ground for steeplechasing.

On the last evening we had a farewell dinner given by the Old Dominion Hunt Pony Club. Our hosts had all been so kind and generous and I was very glad they were able to join us. We had a very pleasant evening. The pony clubbers had made many new friends and it is always sad saying goodbye, but I know the kids all had a great time, meeting new people, seeing new places, riding and hunting in such beautiful countryside – an excellent cultural exchange.

National examiners: We had 2 potential National examiners, Yolanda Bloomers and Janette Carr. They each shadowed a B2 test and Janette has applied to be a National Examiner.

Governance: Our committee of five individuals had a busy year collecting, compiling, and reviewing policies and procedures used in our region. Our goal was to check these against National policy, question the relevancy, and to standardize the language used. Ultimately we would like to put them all together and have them accessible via the website to facilitate better and consistent information given out. We also reviewed our Regional Rules and Regulations and compiled a list of recommended amendments which was presented to the Regional committee and accepted at the AGM. These have been forwarded to National for final approval.

Quiz: BCLM hosted Regional Quiz on February 18, 2006 in Langley. Our judge was Erin Borrow and scorers were Phil Beall, Becky Beall, and Michelle Bouska. Quiz was well attended with 219 active members attending. We again offered competition for all levels of pony club.

The top 4 competitors from both the C2 and A/B level went on to represent our Region at the National Competition held on October 6-9, 2006 in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. They were:

Prince Philip Games: Successful 2006 season. We offered 3 Regional playdays as well as the Regional Final. There was a great turnout of members from our region. EMR won the Regional Final and went on to Ontario to compete in the Canadian Championships where they finished 2nd in the A division.

Danielle Cornish of EMR and Ali Vilvang of Vancouver went to the National tryouts hosted in Ontario. Ali was selected for the team and Danielle was selected as the alternate.

BCLM hosted the Masters Nationals drawing teams from Ontario, Alberta, BCLM and BC Islands. Our BCLM team placed 3rd overall.

Showjumping: Hosted our Regional show at Milner Downs in Langley on June 03, 2006. We had 44 horse/riders and 34 pony/rider combinations. The committee decided to add a starter division of 2'6" for first time competitors. Vancouver PC hosted the Medal Qualifiers and four members competed for the spot to attend the National Medal Finals to be held in Alberta in 2007.

The SJ committee felt that there should be further qualifications within our Region beyond what National has set out in the National Medal Finals Qualification Criteria. Since competitors are required to jump a 3' course on an unknown horse, it was unanimously agreed that BCLM's candidate would need to be a minimum of a C. It is important to note that it is not until the C1 level that members have demonstrated the ability to jump 3'.

Tetrathlon: We are excited to have made a resounding come backing 2006. We attended 3 BC Modern Pentathlon competitions and sent a woman's team made up of 2 members from Alouette PC, 1 from Arrowsmith, and 1 from Cowichan Valley to Nationals where they placed second. Our lone junior boy placed 3rd overall.

We also held a clinic in which we were able to introduce the discipline of Tetrathlon to our Region. We picked up 6 new members.

Rally: We hosted our Regional ABCD Rally from July 20-23, 2006 at MREC. We had 16 ABC teams and 10 D teams accounting for 116 competitors. Even though these were probably the hottest days of our summer, everyone survived the heat without incident and had a great time.

Alberta South Region 2006 Annual Report

Alberta South Region had 17 branches with a total membership of 279 for 2006.

TESTING

Alberta South held two C2, B, and B2 practical tests in 2005. We had one successful B2 candidate and four C2 candidates.

EDUCATION

An examiners clinic was held for new examiners and to update previous examiners. Most Branches ran their own D Camp. An ABC Camp was hosted by the High Country branch and was well attended. David Godson was the clinician.

Winter Theory – The region presented a winter theory “day” set up as a mock test. Each candidate did all stable management topics one-on-one with individual examiners. All candidates felt that this was the best format that they had experienced to date. Comments from candidates suggested the following; - due to the age of the candidates and driving distances in often-poor conditions, this addressed their strong/weak points without committing too much time and they could pursue more instruction on their own time and in their own area of the region. Having one-on-one time with the examiners gave them an in depth view of their personal situation. The spring theory also gave the candidates a written evaluation of their stable management, which satisfied the national requirement for phases one, and three of the B2 test and phase one of the B. The ABC camp provided the riding evaluation for the 2006 test.

QUIZ

On Saturday, April 8, 2006, Bearspaw Pony Club hosted the 2006 Alberta South Region Pony Club Quiz at the Delacour Community Center. Quiz was very well attended with 12 of the Region's branches attending, with a combined total of 101 participants. Participating were 7 teams in the Snurf Division, 13 teams in the Junior Division, 4 teams in the Intermediate Division, and 1 team in the Senior Division. The Intermediate and Senior Divisions use this Regional Quiz as a qualifier to progress on to the National Quiz, which was held in Regina this year.

RALLY

The Mini Creek and Priddis Pony Club branches hosted the Alberta South Region E/D Rally. The Rally was held at the DeWinton Riding Club on July 22nd, 2006. The event was very well attended.

PPG

Three Alberta South Region PPG Clinics were held this spring, hosted by High Country Pony Club at the Millarville Racetrack Arena. Each clinic was three hours long and covered stretching and warm up exercises, safety checks, and the riders were introduced to the various games. At the same time, parents were provided with information on PPG, including information on how to access the internet for National PPG rules and were given information on upcoming clinics and competitions. In addition, parents were encouraged to help out with equipment setup and to make themselves familiar with how the games are played.

Due to the incredible response, numbers had to be limited. Approximately 30 enthusiastic riders and parents from all over the region were able to attend, some more than once. Tessa wins the prize for driving the furthest (she lives 1 ½ hours East of Lethbridge!). Most of the participants had never played games before but all seemed to really enjoy the experience of learning a new skill.

A special thank you to our instructors (Kirsten Riphagen, Becky Treich, Chris Treich, Branwen Martindale, Nina Steetz and Nani Steetz), all from High Country Pony Club. A big thank you also to Jackie Rawn for handling finances, Serena Martindale for organizing equipment set-up and

Faye Dobek (Dewinton) for setting up the snack table. Parents were also very helpful with equipment setup and did an excellent job on the poop scooping! At our final clinic, Bob Cox (Davisburg) very generously donated his time and cooking skills and the fixings for a wind-up BBQ and other parents provided doughnuts, cookies, carrots sticks etc.

DRESSAGE

The ABS Dressage Championships was held at the Agriplex in Claresholm, AB on August 26, 2006.

A big thank you goes out to the Delacour branch for all of their hard work in organizing this event. Over 100 members attended this event, which was also used as the qualifier for the Provincial Dressage Championships.

The Alberta South Region sent 12 riders to the Provincial Dressage Championships held on September 30th in Olds. This was the first year of this new format that was set up to replace the Prairie Zone competition. Due to the low number of riders attending zonal competitions across the country, it was decided at the Discipline's Conference in January 2006 that provinces would hold provincial competitions in place of zones.

SHOW JUMPING

The Show Jumping Championships for the Alberta South Region were held on Sunday, August 27 at the Agriplex in Claresholm.

TETRATHLON

Six Alberta South Pony Club Branches had members participating in Tetrathlon in 2006. The Calgary Training Club provides formal training from the beginning of January to the end of June each year in 3 of the 4 Tetrathlon events; air pistol target shooting, swimming, and running. Members receive riding instruction through their respective branch by attending mounted meets and clinics and-or through private riding instruction. Currently the Calgary Training Club offers twice-weekly coached swim practices, weekly coached shooting practices and bi-monthly running clinics.

The Calgary Training Club sponsored several fun mini-meets throughout the year as a way for Tetrathletes to actually experience and learn from competing without the pressure as they are just for fun. The Central Alberta Pony Club Branches that participate in Tetrathlon were invited to attend, and in fact several Pony Clubbers from the Red Deer area did come and participate. The Alberta South Region hosted a Regional Tetrathlon competition June 24th and June 25th, in the Calgary and Cochrane area. It was a combined event with Alberta Modern Pentathlon Provincials. This year, for the first time ever, Alberta North hosted their own Regional Tetrathlon competition. Central Tetrathletes could choose between either Regional competitions as their numbers don't yet justify having their own regional competition. Twenty-one competitors competed over the two days in five events; shooting, fencing, swimming, riding (both stadium and cross-country) and running. Fifteen of these competitors were registered and scored in the four Tetrathlon events. Six Alberta South Pony Clubbers qualified to go to Nationals, hosted this year by Western Ontario Region, held in the Toronto area Aug. 6th to 11th, 2006.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM CANADIAN NATIONAL TETRATHLON

(The International competitors were not scored individually)

- Tyra McCarthy (Horizon branch) had a perfect score of 1500 in the Riding event and received a 3rd place ribbon! (Way to go Tyra – 1st time competitor at Nationals!)
- Courtney Isbister (Davisburg branch) received a 3rd in Swimming, a 5th in Shooting and a 5th in Running.
- Alicia Berger (Cochrane branch) received a 5th place in the Swimming and a 6th place in Shooting.
- The Alberta Team of Courtney Isbister, Kristy Edwards, Tyra McCarthy and Alanna Bowie, (from Central) placed 4th overall!

INTERNATIONAL TETRATHLON

International Tetrathlon is held every second year and is hosted by two countries, with participants spending part of the tour in one country and the rest of the tour in the second country. The United States and Canada share hosting duties, as do Great Britain and Ireland. When competing internationally in Tetrathlon there are slight differences in each country. For example, although most countries shoot with air pistols, in Ireland all competitors use rifles. Most other countries use turning targets for the shooting.

The 2006 International Tetrathlon Exchange was hosted by Canada and the United States starting in the USA from July 26 – August 5, with competitions in Lexington, Virginia and West Virginia. The switch over occurring at Niagara Falls on August 5, then the International Teams competed at the Canadian Pony Club Nationals from August 6-11th, just outside of Toronto, Ontario.

Thank you to Lenora Shiels who moved into this position and quickly organized our Regional Winter Theory program. Our high ratio of successful Testing candidates demonstrated that our Education programs seem to be working well. All C2 candidates with the exception of one passed their C2....we had no B or A level Candidates test this year, which we hope to change for 2007.

We hosted a DC/ADC Workshop in January in conjunction with a Regional General Meeting. The plan was a full 8 hour day for all. Coffee and Donuts and a hot lunch were provided by a local Sponsor for the 80 that we expected. Unfortunately we had the blizzard of the year that day so attendance was only a quaint 17.....needless to say lots of leftovers remained, however an informative session was had.

Regional Quiz set an attendance record this year. We had significantly more members participate than previous years and so we were busting at the seams trying to accommodate everyone. This further created a complication in our scoring program which resulted in an error in the results.....a bit embarrassing to all involved however it was corrected and the amended placing and awards were distributed at our Regional Awards Banquet in the fall.

PPG practices followed in the spring with a very well attended training camp as is tradition in our Region on the May long weekend. Jane Goodliffe, our Regional PPG Chair is a seasoned veteran at hosting this camp and as usual it was full to capacity with eager PPGers learning and developing their skills. The Regional PPG competition is always well attended and a great time for competitors and spectators.

ANR had an extraordinary number of PPG International Candidates tryout this year and although they were all obviously very talented at Games, only two could be selected to move on to the Canadian tryout Camp. Our Regional Finals were moved from the traditional mid September timeframe to late August. All in all this went very well and all three Alberta Regions are keen to continue and develop this year end competition.

In October ANR sent two teams to National Quiz in Saskatchewan. Our C team placed "in the ribbons" which was a terrific accomplishment. I also attended National Quiz in Saskatoon as ANR will be hosting National Quiz in 2007 . Congratulations to Saskatchewan Region for such a successful competition; you did an outstanding job of hosting this mammoth event. CENTRAL ONTARIO REGIONAL **REPORT 2006**

C.O.R. had a great year in 2006 with a few bumps along the way.

The year started with the Disciplines Conference in Winnipeg. This enthused all of the people who attended. It allowed for the instigation of new ideas and everyone was encouraged by the results

We had eight (8) branches submit their own Rules & Regs. We had a total membership of 463 members in 28 branches. Eighty eight percent (88%) were in the D2 and lower levels. 150 of these members tested this year and we are very slowly starting to see an increase in our higher levels.

Financially we are in good shape despite our dramatic increase in the cost for ABC rally.

Our communications persons are at the top of their game, working hard to get the word out to all. However, unless the branches learn how to read we are oft times struggling.

The Education committee ran several seminars for C level and up, as well as the more advanced D2s. They covered Conformation, foot & shoeing,, bits & biting, first aid, conditioning, bandaging, natural horsemanship and a mounted jumper clinic with such people as Neil Badcock and Rand Bird. 87 members attended over the season.

47 members from 12 branches attended our working rally for riding lessons in dressage, cross-country and show jumping, as well as stable management and lecturers/hands on sessions in bandaging, lunging, braiding and horse health check. We would be remiss if we did not note that Greenhawk Harness & Equestrian supplies donated 5mane combs, 50 braiding combs, 25 thermometers and 25 stethoscopes for our participants.

We had 150 participants from 17 clubs (some from our northern area) for our regional quiz. We sent a C and ABC team to Nationals where we were thrilled with their accomplishments. We also put together a committee to start organizing for National Quiz 2008.

Dressage had three qualifiers and finals this year. We had an increase in riders representing 16 branches this year.

Prince Phillip Games, always a biggy in C.O.R., was very active as usual. 91 members from 13 clubs competed at the three meets. The Zones only had two regions represented, as S.L.O.V. had no teams to send this year. We had three

teams from C.O.R. and W.O.R. could only send two teams at the last minute. We also hosted the National A meet in 2006. B.C., Alberta and Ontario competed with Nova Scotia attending to observe. Nova Scotia also received first hand training on mounts (from Charlie Durward) to give them a better perspective. There were four candidates trying out for the IMGE. Two of the candidates went to the try-outs in W.O.R and both were selected for the team.

The Pascoe family held an IMGE camp for the participants going to Britain this year.

We ended our PPG season doing a demo at the Royal Winter Fair again. This year we were invited to present in the big arena. Two teams from W.O.R. and C.O.R. put on a great demonstration with parents from all sorts of clubs helping. It was an incredible showing of camaraderie and friendship.

ABC rally included our D2s this year and took place over three days. 33 riders from eight clubs had the time of their lives doing entry, pre-training and training courses.

D rally had 62 competitors. We added several different awards this year best turnout in all three phases as well as manners, ten outstanding groom awards and the "My pony is always Good at Home Award" for the rider who had a less than perfect day but showed great sportsmanship and attitude. We had many falls this year. This problem has been addressed and we do not anticipate a similar occurrence.

314 riders showed up for the three qualifiers and one final for show jumping competitions. The medals class was much better understood this year and we changed our speed class to a power and speed class. This was very successful and we are seeing some changes for the positive in our already good calibre of riding.

Our Tet was cancelled due to a dramatic decrease in tetrathletes this year. W.O.R. was great about fitting us in with them and we are in the process of arranging clinics to introduce the newbie's to Tet.

All in all, a good year as my first year in the regional chair position. I have many great people working around me. I am pleased with much and working on just as much. Some of the clubs organizers have a far too 'laissez faire' attitude and have yet to realize the seriousness of their inactivity. All will be well. The area is huge, the clubs are many and my whip and chair are not big enough yet.

2006 ANNUAL REPORT WESTERN ONTARIO REGION CANADIAN PONY CLUB

WOR fielded an almost full slate of officers and Discipline Chairs for 2006 representing a total of 13 branches. We did not have an Education Chair this year but some of our clubs did arrange senior education meetings, which they opened to the Region. Our membership experienced a small increase to 253 active members. Financially WOR continues on a very sound footing. A steady source of extra funding has been the percentage of sales from Brubacher's Harness/Ailsa Craig Saddlery in exchange for advertising on our Regional Home page.

WOR experienced both satisfying accomplishments and significant disappointments during 2006. We worked hard to assist in the success of National and International Tetrathlon on Aug 6-11th which took place in our Zone and for which we provided a large number of mounts and volunteer help. The unfortunate loss of the main facility was quickly overcome by the finding of another facility, which was able to accommodate most of our needs. We also hosted the International PPG tryouts on September 1st.

All disciplines held Regional competitions –

Quiz – May 6th - 166 competitors in 7 divisions – All 13 branches were represented. Held in Guelph. Sent 10 competitors to National Quiz including one affiliate. Games were again offered during the marking time and were well received. Quiz continues to be an extremely popular discipline in WOR as evidenced both by the level of participation and the considerable profit realized primarily as a result of the used tack sale, which is held in conjunction with this event each year.

Tetrathlon – June 24-25th – 32 competitors in 6 divisions – 8 went on to Nationals and we had 1 on the International team. Held at Old Orchard Farm. WOR's success in this discipline can be attributed at least in part to active participation by the members in a number of training opportunities e.g. Minimeets, participation in affiliated discipline competitions e.g. Crossman Shooting, Modern Pentathlon, etc.

PPG – July 8th – 111 competitors. We added a new division for lead line this year in the hope that more younger riders would be able to participate and learn the games in a safe environment. Held at the Fergus Fairgrounds. We had 1 candidate make the International PPG team, an ongoing tradition the past few years for WOR.

Show Jumping/Dressage – July 22nd (combined one day event) – 63 entries in 6 divisions in Show Jumping; 54 entries in 7 classes in Dressage as well as Free Style, Pas-de-deux and Quadrille teams. These numbers are higher than last year. Held at the Ancaster Fairgrounds.

A/B/C- Rally – July 14-17th – 20 competitors in 3 divisions and 20 grooms, at Checkmate. A new division was added this year at the entry level.

D-Rally – August 19th – 60 competitors in 3 divisions, at Caledon Hunt Club

For the first 4 months we had assistance from some of our local clubs (due to the vacant Education Chair) to provide Sr. Education workshops at the same time and place as the monthly Regional meetings and these were well attended. This allowed branch reps. who were coming to the meeting anyway, to transport their senior members and provided some consistency of topics covered across the Region. Branches are also communicating their Education plans to the rest of the Region and inviting others to participate as they are able.

Testing – Members are continuing to test and move up through the levels. WOR had one successful member who wrote the 2006 A test. Of those writing the C2 and B tests, 4 B's and 3 C2's passed. WOR held a practical B2 make-up test and A screening test at Cedar Peaks and Cantercall Farms. We had 1 member successfully complete her B2. WOR participated in planning and conducting a National HA test at Cedar Peaks. We had 1 member successfully achieve her HA and 1 member successfully achieved his B.

International CPC participants – Jean Eagleson competed on the International Tetrathlon Team and Erin Hendriksen competed on the International Games Team.

1. Press Releases/ Publicity Campaign, 2006

Press releases were sent to seventeen publications giving results of International Tetrathlon, National Tetrathlon, National PPG, National Masters and National Quiz. Eventing News sent a reporter and photographer to cover National and International Tet. For the first time in my memory, Horse Life Canada (EC) published articles on our competitions. Horse Sport again asked for a recap article and photos – my thanks to Phil Crowe and Bev Pascoe (COR) for providing photos. The article this year will be shorter and will appear later. **Occupied a full page in the December 2006 issue.**

2. Wall of Fame

Progress is slow.

I have compiled a database of potential inductees, and there are 100 names on it. I have nothing in the way of contact information for the vast majority of these people.

Six inductees have sent me their information forms: Alan Ehrlick (retiring President of the OEF and Olympic eventer), Colin Peace (a most impressive CV from the UK and Canada) Joni-Lynn Peters (Ontario and BC eventer, dressage rider and level III coach), Jim Henry (Ontario, Pan Am Games medallist in eventing and Olympian), Chelan Kozak (eventer) and Joshua Riker-Fox (BC, who competed for Canada in Modern Pentathlon at the most recent Pan Am Games while still an active PC member). Josh has sent me the names and contact information for three other Pentathletes who are PC alumni, but I have yet to contact them.

There are several people to whom I have sent the material, and who have agreed orally, plus others to whom Karol has spoken. It seems many reminders will be necessary.

What Needs To Be Done?

Several ideas were discussed at SAM:

- ***We need to re-launch the project:***

We need to post a write-up of the Wall of Fame on the home page of our web site so that the people we approach can go there and read an expanded version of what we give/send them. - **DONE**

Re-write the criteria and introduction documents so they look more professional - **DONE**

A new set of press releases should be written and distributed to the equestrian media. I'm not sure how profitable it is to distribute to Discipline Organizations (one of which has since set up its own Wall of Fame), but certainly yes to the PSAs. Distribution is up to the Board to Decide. – **ON HOLD**

- ***We need to decide the style of the text.***

Crawford would like to see the information reworked into a narrative format. I had thought to let the inductees speak for themselves, subject to (hopefully) minor editing for grammar, syntax and punctuation. In either case, their personal recollections of their Pony Club days should be as close to verbatim as possible. – **ON HOLD**

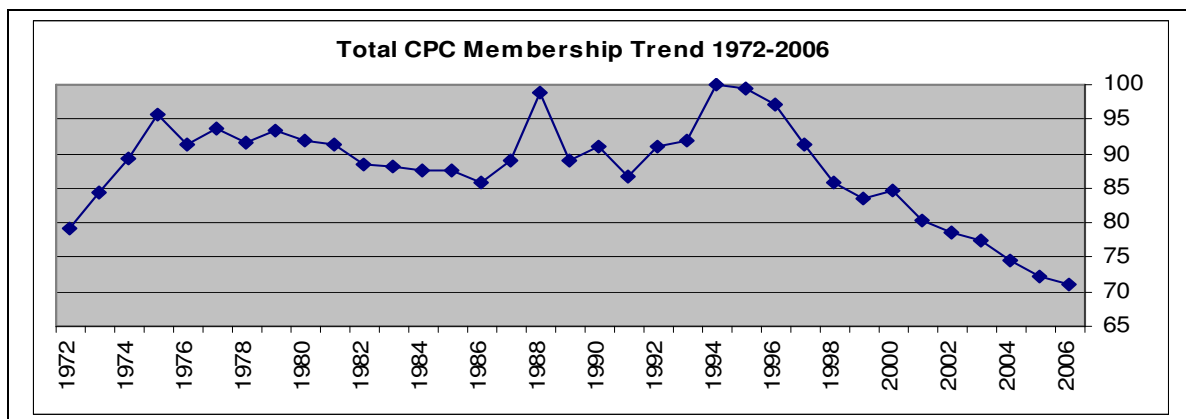
- In addition, Karol is working on a Power Point presentation we can use to promote the project in various equestrian venues. She will be using material from the Pony Club history published in 1982.
- I am working, currently, on the profiles of founders and builders who are no longer with us. This will involve material from the history, plus other sources. Winter/early spring is a very bad time to try to reach active competitors, coaches, chefs d'equipe because so many of them are out of the country at this time of year.

Report on 2006 Membership

Our 2006 registration was 2944 members which is down by 53 members or 1.8% from the 2005 total. This is the 11th out of the past 12 years in which our membership has dropped. The following chart shows the total CPC membership trend for the last 35 years. Regional trends are available but not included in this report.



Seven of 13 regions decreased in membership while six gained. The NBPEI region continued to regain membership and Alberta North set an all time high membership for the region for the third consecutive year!

Several other graphs showing membership trends by age and by test levels are also available but are not part of this report. Among other things, these charts illustrate that compared to the early to mid 1990's, for the past 5-10 years we have been losing fewer senior members and more young members.

Registration and Records Procedures:

As agreed at the last AGM, the Excel spreadsheet used for registrations has been significantly upgraded so that missing information, over or under-age applicants, expired PSO memberships and other errors will be highlighted for each regional membership contact.

PSO Membership Issues:

The conference in Toronto last winter and some changes to the membership procedure instructions which directly address some of the issues related to PSO memberships have had some good effects; however issues such as saying that memberships have been given to a branch when they have not and slow processing of both CPC and PSO applications continue to be problems. Regions need to address these problems more proactively since they know the branch personnel better and should be aware of the problems earlier.

Most PSO's have gone out of their way to provide forms for renewal of memberships well in advance of when the forms are available to the general public. This is intended to help us out by being able to handle new applications and renewals at the same time and to help the PSO's by moving some work away from their busy period. Two large PSO's have specifically mentioned that they are disappointed in the number of early renewals.

Affiliate Memberships:

The number of Affiliate members was 28, nearly the same as the 25 we had in 2005. In order to better recognize long service members who were not able to join in their 20th year, the Board has changed the Affiliate Member policy to allow anyone who was an Active Member for any 7 years to become an Affiliate until age 24.

Associate Memberships:

Last spring, we developed a new Associate Membership form and it has been posted on the website for some time. Please have all Associate members fill out these forms and send them to the National Office.

Privacy Issues:

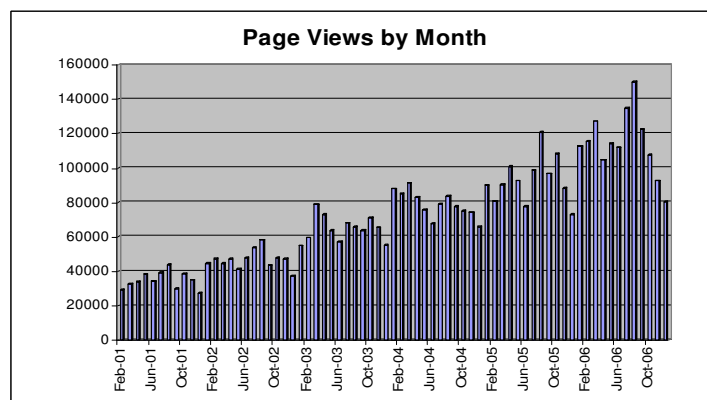
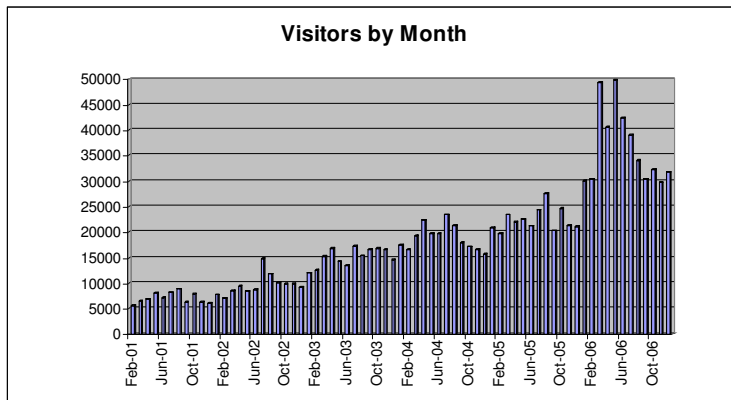
We have had many problems over the years due to the 2 paragraphs on the front of the membership form which deal with privacy issues, one regarding mailing and the other publicity. The Board has concluded that we don't have the resources to administer individual privacy agreements properly and therefore revised our policy beginning in the 2008 membership year such that the Pony Club reserves the right to use all member names and photos as part of results reporting or publicity promotions. This is similar to most other volunteer organizations.

Website Report for 2006

In 2006, we had 439,711 visitors to the site, **up more than 170,000 or 63%** from our total of 268,988 in 2005. Prior to this year, our highest monthly visitor total was 27,610 in August of 2005. In 2006 we had every month above that number with a high of nearly 50,000 in May. Over the past few months, the numbers have decreased but are still running around 35,000.

The increase in visitors seems to be relatively well spread across the site. No particular area showed a large spike. All areas of the site except NBPEI and the 3 Alberta regions showed significant increased use during the period of high numbers of visits.



The guestbook was removed from the site in April. The removal has had little effect on the website and there have been no complaints about the loss, however it has definitely saved a lot of my time which was wasted policing the guestbook for inappropriate messages.

In the past year, 4 branches/regions have taken advantage of the free ftp access offer for maintaining their own pages. We had allowed up to \$500 or the equivalent of about 15 accounts.

The BC Islands Region has now also moved their pages to our server. All regional pages are now on the CPC server.

We cannot track visitors to regional pages, however we do track the number of page views for each region. Graphs of the activity for each region and for other high use areas of the website back to 2001 are available on request but are not included in this report. There is not now a plot for BC Islands since there is no history available.

At this point, about 125 responses alumni have responded to the invitation on the main page asking them to update their contact information.

A Wall of Fame design was put on the website in September Board review and it looks like we have the basic design established. It is still very much a work in progress as we wait for writeups from more "inductees". The Wall will be made public once we have 15 or 20 people included on it.

As usual, many areas of the website are not well maintained and contain much outdated information as well as many files which can no longer be accessed because the links to them have disappeared. I will be taking a more active position in getting these items cleaned up in the future.
